
Younger people struggle with writing and the data shows that the problem is only getting worse. See what's going on with these metrics.

4/5 Underperform In 2011, the National Center for Educational Statistics reported that 80% of students are not proficient writers. Additionally, there is a gender gap as females outscored men by an average of 20 points from grades 8 to 12. * * This data was based on computer-based

assessments administered in 2010.

Early Age Problem

It's very clear that the "writing" problem starts very early on in a student's life. Less than three hours per week makes up just 15% of the total time spent watching television.

Writing Aversion

An inquiry paper published in 2008 by a PSU student investigated the reasons behind why students don't like to write. The study collected answers from 11th graders and here were the top

- "I don't know how to write"
- "I don't know what the teacher wants"
- "I don't like the writing prompts"

There were more reasons included, but these were the top ones. Young writers clearly feel confused about the requirements and don't know how to proceed.
